

ALBUM OF MEMORIES

2003 marked the 125th anniversary of the church on its present site, in the centre of Tewkesbury, by the town Cross, where the main roads meet. The present church replaced two earlier chapels, the first one opened by the Reverend John Wesley on 4th July 1777. An enlarged chapel was opened on the same site in 1814. This building still exists in Tolsey Lane, just across the road from the present church, and is used as an antiques centre.

John Wesley visited Tewkesbury at least 23 times. In 2003 we celebrated our own milestone as a church alongside the 300th anniversary of the birth of John Wesley.

The present church was opened on 5th June 1878. Over the years many improvements have been made to the premises with a complete refurbishment taking place in 1999-2000.

This album records something of the life of Tewkesbury Methodist Church in 2003 - a year of special celebrations The leaflet that follows lists the activities taking place in the church as at October 2003.

The community organisations hiring the premises for their activities change from time-to-time, especially those organised by U3A (University of the Third Age) which can be seasonal.

The number of community groups using the premises has increased considerably since re-opening in 2000 following the refurbishment of the premises.

Church has year of celebrations

THIS year Tewkesbury Methodist Church celebrates 125 years of being The Church at the Cross.

The main celebrations, including a talk by Lord Hattersley on his book based on the life of John Wesley, and an exhibition on the life and work of the church, take place in June – the actual anniversary of the founding of the

One project, however, is expected to take most of the year to complete.

The Methodist Anniversary tapestry is being planned as a whole community effort. Its intricate design, featuring pictures of the front and interior of the church, and the words 125 years of the Church at the Cross, are expected to take more than 204,000 stitches to complete.

It will be worked on at coffee mornings and other events throughout the year.

To help with church funds people will be invited to pay to either put stitches into it themselves, or sponsor others to do it for them.

The church opened on June 3, 1878, and the celebrations will start on Thursday, June 3, with Lord Hattersley's talk, which takes place in the Watson Hall.

on June 5 there will be a special service with civic and ecumenical guests, followed by a buffet and preview of an exhibition on the life and work of the

The exhibition will run until Saturday, June 7. The previous day there will be a performance of Seeds, Roots and Fruits, a specially written drama celebrating the 300th anniversary of the birth of John Wesley and the life of the church in Tewkesbury

There will be a second performance on Saturday afternoon, followed in the evening by a concert by the Silurian Consort.







THIS WILL HAVE THEM IN STITCHES ALL YEAR Methodist Anniversary tapestry is a whole community effort

The making of a special tapestry will be a feature of the anniversary celebrations at Tewkesbury Methodist Church, Gloucestershire, which, this year, celebrates 125 years on its present site, at the cross in the town centre.

The 30" x 35" (76cms x 89cms) tapestry has been designed by church member Hazel Miles. Views of the front and interior of the church are set against a tile design used in the building of the church in 1878. The anniversary is recorded with the words "Celebrate 125 years of the Church at the Cross".

The builder of the church, Thomas Collins, a prominent citizen of Tewkesbury at the time, was also involved in restoration work at Tewkesbury's ancient Abbey and the same tiles used in the Methodist Church can be seen in the Abbey.

To help church funds, people will be invited to put stitches in the tapestry at 2p a stitch, or sponsor someone to do it for them. Work on the tapestry will continue throughout the year at coffee mornings and other events. The work will need a lot of time as the total number of stitches in the design is around 204,000.

Reflections of Church Street, Tewkesbury are sponsoring this venture by allowing us to purchase tapestry wool at a substantial discount.



A TAPESTRY is to be made to hang at Tewkesbury church as part of celebrations for the 125th anniversary of the church on its current site. Designed by member Hazel Miles, the tapestry will feature views of the front and the interior of the church and a tile design used in the building in 1878.

The builder of the church, at The Cross, Tewkesbury, Gloucestershire, was Thomas Collins, a prominent citizen who was also involved in restoration work at Tewkesbury's ancient abbey. In order to help church funds, people will be invited to put stitches in the tapestry at 2p a stitch or sponsor someone to do it for them.

Celebrations and special services will be held from Thursday, June 5, to Sunday, June 8. There is also to be an open-air Wesley tercentenary service on the lawns of the abbey on Sunday, June 22, starting at 3 pm.

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talk to us and each other People in Tewkesbury have found a novel way to celebrate the anniversary of the town's Methodist Church - they're making a tapestry.

Although it was in 1770 that the Methodist community in the town first had a place of worship, at Tolsey Lane, it was in June 1878 that they moved to the present site where the Market House used to be situated.

We're getting everybody to sign a book so we have a permanent record of who has taken part in the making of the tapestry.

Hazel Miles - Tapestry designer

Among the highlights of the past century and a quarter was the period during World War Two when soldiers were camped at the church following the evacuation from Dunkirk in 1940.

At present over 6,000 stitches have been completed in the tapestry with a total of over 200,000 required to complete the tapestry which will show both the interior and exterior of the church.

Painting is part of our heritage

EWKESBURY methodists have uncovered an 18th century painting of the founder of their faith.


Researchers for Tewkesbury Methodist Church discovered the first portrait ever seen in America of John Wesley.

The painting, by an unknown Tewkesbury artist, was discovered while the church was

planning its 125th anniversary.

Mr Wesley owned the portrait himself and gave it to Tewkesbury resident John Cole, who emigrated to America in

He settled near Baltimore, Maryland, and was the last known individual owner

of the painting. It was found in a collection at Drew University, in New Jersey.

Tewkesbury Methodist Church spokesman Michael Jebson said: "We're thrilled. John Wesley visited Tewkesbury on 23 occasions and was here at the very beginning of Methodism in the town."

John Wesley preached at the opening of the old Methodist Chapel in Tolsey Lane in 1777.

A METHODIST MEMORY

A PORTRAIT of John Wesley, believed to be by a Tewkesbury artist, has been unearthed by local Methodists planning an anniversary celebration.


Tewkesbury Methodist Church is 125 years old and it was while researching for a drama documentary that will form part of the celebrations that they learned about the picture (above), now housed at Drew University in Madison, New Jersey.

They have discovered that Wesley, the founder of Methodism, gave the portrait to John Cole, of Tewkesbury, who emigrated to America in 1785, settling near Baltimore, Maryland. It is based on a portrait by Nathaniel Hone, now in the National Portrait Gallery in London. It was the first painting of Wesley to be seen in America.

Tewkesbury Methodist spokesman Michael Jebson said: "Research has not yet revealed any information about the background of Tewkesbury migrant John Cole, although Cole is a popular local name."

A copy of the painting has been sent to Tewkesbury Methodists, to be used in their drama-documentary—Seeds, Roots and Fruits, which will be presented at the Church on Friday and Saturday, June 6 and 7.

FOUND IN THE USA - A picture by a mystery Tewkesbury artist

Searching for pictures for use in a 125th anniversary drama-documentary, Tewkesbury Methodists have received a copy of the first portrait seen in America of John Wesley. Housed in the collection of Drew University, Madison, New Jersey, the picture of the 18th century evangelist is by a Tewkesbury, Gloucestershire artist.

The picture will feature in the specially-written drama-documentary 'Seeds, Roots and Fruits', which links the story of Methodism in Tewkesbury to the international celebrations this year of the 300th anniversary of the birth of John Wesley.

Wesley visited Tewkesbury 23 times, making frequent references to the town in his famous journal. One example is given below *

Records show that John Wesley gave the portrait of himself to John Cole (1750-1808) who emigrated to America in 1785 and settled near Baltimore, Maryland. The attractive portrait by the unknown local artist is based on the portrait of Wesley by Nathaniel Hone in the National Portrait Gallery, London.

Research has not yet revealed any information about the background of Tewkesbury migrant John Cole, although Cole is a popular local name.

'Seeds, Roots and Fruits', with a cast of 50 people drawn from the Methodist church community, will be performed on Friday 6 June at 7.30pm and on Saturday 7 June at 2pm at the church.

^{*}March 1789 - After preaching to a large congregation at Stroud at five am, we rode to Tewkesbury, notice having been given of my preaching at noon at a house a mile from the town. But we could not get to it, the floods were so high, so I intended to go straight to Worcester. But one informing me a congregation from all parts was waiting, we set out another way, and waded through the water. (John Wesley, Journal)


In term time, when all activities and organisations are meeting, the church, hall and Guild room are used by several hundred people each week.




PAINTING for PLEASURE





2003 - 125 years at the Cross SIX SPECIAL DAYS OF CELEBRATION

"It was such a happy time" seems to sum up the feelings of most people about the church's 125th anniversary celebrations at the beginning of June. The celebrations were also linked in several ways to the 300th anniversary of the birth of John Wesley.

Tuesday 3 June - Local preacher Keith Springthorpe tells us about our evening with a celebrity guest who spoke at the first event:

Our Wesley tercentenary celebrations began with a visit by Lord Roy Hattersley, the former deputy leader of the Labour Party, who gave a talk about his new book, 'A Brand from the Burning', the life of the founder of Methodism, John Wesley. Although not a Christian, Lord Hattersley gave a detailed account of the remarkable influence of John Wesley from his childhood years, the significant competing influences of his father and mother, up to the organisation of the Methodist Connexion. Roy Hattersley said that Wesley was one of the founders of modern Britain and not just of Methodism. By evangelising the new working poor, he encouraged them to become ambitious, industrious and respectable which created a new church and built a new nation.

Thursday 5 June - the anniversary of the opening of the church in 1878 was celebrated with a special evening service. There was a colourful procession with civic guests from the Town and Borough. Readings from the letters of Paul and Peter preceded a challenging message from the Rev Carrie Seaton who reminded us that the real church is built of Living Stones - us. During the service the beautiful anniversary

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Six Brownies from the 1st Tewkesbury pack, who meet on our premises, were a wonderful help with the production and said they really enjoyed taking part but found it hard to keep quiet at the right time!

On Saturday evening there was a concert by the excellent Silurian Consort, a choir drawn from the three counties, which uses the church for rehearsal. They performed the Magnificat by CPE Bach and Mozart's Mass in C.

On Pentecost Sunday 6 June, a large congregation welcomed our guest preacher, the Rev Dr Inderjit Bhogal, past-President of the Methodist Conference. Dr Bhogal led a lively, happy and challenging service in which he asked us to see ourselves as Rainbow People, each one of us essential to the full spectrum of colours that symbolise God's wonderful and diverse world. A bring-and-share lunch followed the service, with an opportunity for questions and discussion with our visitor.

A member of the cast of 'Seeds, Roots and Fruits' received this message from a neighbour, who has no connection with our church, after they had been to see the production:

What a truly lovely evening. We both enjoyed it. The best evening ever. The lighting, music, choreography were superb - a lot of work but well-worth doing. It was obvious to us what a genuine church you have. Smiling faces, welcoming hands and mutual support for all. Well done.

patchwork cross was on show for the first time. Made from 125 squares in vibrant colours, children from the Junior Church helped make the cross which will have a permanent place in the church. A delicious buffet followed the service and there was the first opportunity to see an exhibition focussing on the present-day life and work of the church and to see displays, loaned by Tewkesbury Museum, about important citizens connected with the church down the years.

Friday and Saturday 6 and 7 June, the church and hall were open for people to call in to see the exhibition and enjoy refreshments.

During Friday morning, nine talented young musicians from Tewkesbury School gave a free concert of chamber music in the church. In the afternoon Tewkesbury CE Primary School presented a lively musical, 'The Trojan Horse'.

Receiving attention on both days was the anniversary tapestry, a year-long project, the work of many people, whose stitches are being sponsored at 2p a time.

Friday evening saw the first performance of the specially written drama-documentary, 'Seeds, Roots and Fruits' telling of John Wesley, his links with Tewkesbury and the story of Methodism in the town from the 18th century to the present day. The production, which involved more than sixty people, had a second performance on Saturday afternoon.

Kirk played a young thief in the drama-documentary. He helped tell the true story of a boy from the church in the early 1800's who, with another lad, escaped execution by being transported to Tasmania. Kirk says it was the best play he had ever been in. He found the rehearsals fun but realised it was 'serious' when he performed in front of a large audience.



JOHN WESLEY SUNDAY ON THE ABBEY LAWN 22 June 2003 SCRIPT FOR A NARRATOR AND JOHN WESLEY

Narr: John Wesley was born 300 years ago this month. He was the fifteenth child, but only the second son, of the Rev Samuel Wesley, Rector of Epworth, Lincolnshire, and his wife Susanna.

When he was only five years old, John survived a terrible fire which engulfed the Epworth Rectory. He was rescued by villagers from an upper window. John's grateful mother, Susanna, used a phrase in the book of Amos in the Bible to describe the rescue of her son. She thanked God for this 'brand plucked from the burning'. She told the little boy that God had saved him for a purpose. John never doubted his mother's words.

As a young man, John went to Oxford university, eventually deciding to follow in his father's footsteps and prepare to be a priest in the Church of England.

At Oxford John was part of a devout group of students, including his famous hymn-writing brother, Charles, and George Whitefield from Gloucester, who met regularly to study the Bible and pray. Other students mocked them, calling them the Holy Club and 'Methodists' because of their orderly life of prayer, worship and service to the poor.

After the death of his father, John and Charles Wesley were called to serve as missionaries to settlers in the young, emerging America.

John soon found he was unsuited for this work. He became entangled in an unfortunate love-affair and the whole venture in America was disastrous.

(John Wesley comes from a place where he has been concealed, joining the group and saying his own words.)

Narr: On the journey home in 1737, John wrote in his famous Journal:

J W: I went to America to convert the Indians, but oh, who shall convert me.

Narr: He did not have long to wait for his heartfelt cry of despair to be answered:

J W: 24th May 1738, City of London. In the evening I went very unwillingly to a society in Aldersgate Street, where one was reading Luther's preface to the Epistle to the Romans.

About a quarter before nine, while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation; and an assurance was given me that he had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death.

Narr: From this life-changing experience John Wesley began his mission. He became one of the most influential people of his day and one of the greatest evangelists of all time.

Narr: Riding on horse-back, John Wesley took the message of the Gospel of Jesus to people all over the British Isles.

He visited Tewkesbury 23 times, coming first in 1744. Here's how Wesley described some of his experiences in the town.

J W: March 1769 - After preaching to a large congregation at Stroud at five am, we rode to Tewkesbury, notice having been given of my preaching at noon at a house a mile from the town. But we could not get to it, the floods were so high, so I intended to go straight to Worcester. But one informing me a congregation from all parts was waiting, we set out another way, and waded through the water.

Narr: Wesley's early preaching in Tewkesbury was under an elm tree which stood near here at the top of Perry Hill.

In July 1777, John Wesley was able to write in his Journal that he had visited a purpose-built chapel near the Cross in Tolsey Lane. A Methodist community was beginning to put down its roots.

J W: I preached in dull Gloucester at 10, and at 6 in the new (preaching) house in Tewkesbury.

Narr: Wesley lived well into his eighties and continued to travel, write letters, keep his journal and preach almost to the end of his life. Here are some quotations from his writings:

J W: Give me one hundred preachers who fear nothing but sin and desire nothing but God and I care not a straw whether they be clergymen or laymen, such alone will shake the gates of hell and set up the Kingdom of God upon earth.

Narr: About having a Catholic Spirit, he writes:

J W: Though we cannot think alike, may we not love alike?

J W: Every wise man will allow others the same liberty of thinking which he desires they should allow him, and will no more insist on their embracing his opinions, than he would have them insist on his embracing theirs.

Narr: One of John's most famous sayings is:

J W: Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, to all the people you can, as long as every you can.

Narr: And near the end of his life he wrote:

J W: I have this day lived fourscore years...God grant that I may never live to be useless.

Narr: As Lord Roy Hattersley shared with us when he recently came here to talk about John Wesley: 'Wesley was one of the architects of modern England. John Wesley's Second Reformation created a new Church and helped build a new nation'.

'A BRAND FROM THE BURNING' The life of John Wesley in Flowers

1. A Pedestal of Welcome

2. One of a large family (Mrs. Jenny Le Marechal)

John Wesley was born on 28th June 1703, the fifteenth child, but only the second son, of Samuel Wesley, rector of Epworth, Lincolnshire, and his wife Susanna.

3. Rescued from the burning rectory (Mrs. Valerie Parker)

When John was five there was a near tragedy. The rectory caught fire and, although the rest of the family managed to escape, John was unable to get down the burning staircase. The little boy dragged a chair to the window and called for help, waiting calmly until he was lifted down. Quoting Scripture, his mother thanked God for this 'brand plucked from the burning', and assured John that God had saved him for a purpose.

4. A Student at Oxford and a Methodist (Mrs. June Green)

At the age of 17 John went up to Oxford and was ordained a deacon in the Church of England. With his brother Charles and other like-minded men, a group met for regular Bible study and prayer. Other students called them the 'Holy Club' and, even more contemptuously, 'Methodists', because of their orderly life of prayer, worship and service to the poor.

- 5. A decorative Pedestal (Mrs. Audrey Simpson)
- A Missionary to America (Mrs. Margaret Taylor and incorporating A Well Dressing created by the Junior Church)

In 1735, with Charles, John went as a Chaplain to the new colony of Georgia in America. He served the settlers and tried to take the Gospel to the North American Indians. He was unsuited for the work and returned to England. On the voyage home he wrote in his Journal, 'I went to America to convert the Indians, but, oh, who shall convert me?

7. John Wesley's Conversion - The 'warmed heart'

(Mrs. Olive Seers)

On Whit Sunday, 24th May, 1738, John Wesley '....went very unwillingly to a society in Aldersgate Street (City of London) where one was reading Luther's preface to the Epistle to the Romans. About a quarter before nine, while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed, I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation.'

8. A Traveller for the Gospel (Mrs. Elsie Johnson)

During his long life John Wesley covered almost 250,000 miles on horse-back in England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland. He was by far the greatest traveller of his day.

- 10. John Wesley visited Tewkesbury many times (Mrs. Mavis Jarvis) Records show that John Wesley visited Tewkesbury at least 23 times. He last visited the town in 1790, at the age of 88, when he preached '.... about twelve, but the house would not contain the congregation.'
- 11. A decorative arrangement (Mrs. Janet Norman)
- 12. A decorative arrangement (Mrs. Hilary Woolford)
- 13. **The decorative balcony showers** (Mrs. Jenny Le Marechal and Mrs. June Green)
- 14. John Wesley's Journal (Mrs. Angela Thompson)
 John Wesley kept a record of all his travels and activities in his Journal,
 a document that has been compared in importance to the diary of
 Samuel Pepys, as a record of the times in which he lived.
- 15. The life of caring for others (Mrs. June Green)


Throughout his life John Wesley helped the poor, visited prisoners, set up orphanages, supported the abolition of slavery, practised simple medicine......and more.

2003-125 years at the Cross

On the 4th July 1777 John Wesley preached in Tewkesbury at the opening of the first purpose-built chapel in Tolsey Lane, almost opposite the present Church. The congregation outgrew this chapel and a new, larger one was built on the same site and opened in October 1814. This building is now the Tewkesbury Antique Centre. The Church in which you are now is on the site of the old Market House, by the Town Cross, and was opened 125 years ago on 5th June 1878.
