

# Some of the funny, sad or strange experiences during my years of Ministry

In September 1964 I began training for the Methodist Ministry at Wesley House, Cambridge (address - Wesley House, Jesus Lane!). I shall always be grateful for the 3 years there, but have to admit that in comparison with the other Ministerial Training colleges Wesley House was rather behind the times. For instance, there was a Cambridge University statute that no student could travel more than 5 miles from the centre of Cambridge without an "exeat", written permission to do so. Needless to say this was no longer enforced - except at Wesley House! On one of Eileen's weekend visits to Cambridge we decided that we would like to go to London for the day, and so I approached the Principal, a very learned and indeed kindly man, with a request for an exeat. "Oh John, you are a gadabout, you know . You had an exeat last term "!!

Exeats were not required for our Sunday preaching appointments in the surrounding counties, which sometimes involved a lot of travelling and a night away, or even two.

In addition to these, we took it in turn to be on call in case of a sudden request for a preacher, and it was my fortune (misfortune?) to be on call when George Thomas (later Viscount Tonypandy, Speaker of the House of Commons, and at that time Secretary of State for Wales) couldn't fulfill his appointments for the Men's Weekend at Wesley Memorial, Cambridge. They found a satisfactory alternative for the morning service, but decided to use the student on call for the evening. All went well until the sermon, when the public address system started picking up messages to and from a local taxi firm. My utterances were punctuated by requests to go to this or that address! My fit of giggles didn't help restore my dignity, nor did the fact that my gown caught in the elaborate metal work of the pulpit steps as I descended at the end

of the service and brought my progress to an abrupt end! A postscript to this - many years later I was recounting this incident when somebody said that she had heard George Thomas once say that he had had a very narrow escape in Cambridge!

My training was completed in 1967, and Eileen and I were able to marry and move to my first appointment, which was in Washington -CD (County Durham), rather than DC. Our first Manse must certainly feature in this story, with its 13 rooms (including a bedroom for the servant). We should have realised it would be damp when we were given the address - The Manse, Spout Lane. There was indeed a well in the back garden. The tier of our wedding cake that we had kept for Christmas was mouldy long before then, and when we returned from our first holiday the following summer the carpet in the hall was mildewed. The house was of course far too big for a working couple, and we tended to live in a sort of breakfast room beyond the kitchen. which still had a range and side oven (very useful for warming gloves in a cold North Eastern winter!). The Dining room was so cold that if we were to entertain we had to have a fire in there for a couple of days beforehand - and the fire smoked dreadfully. The remedy for this was to remove a tile from the hearth so that there was a permanent hole there. Even more bizarre, the remedy for the sheets on our bed being damp was to provide us with an electric blanket!!

I'm not sure whether my next story comes in the category of "funny" or "sad" - when I got in the bad books of an elderly lady, and all because of a prayer. At the Annual Meeting of the Sisterhood at one of my four churches in Washington I made what I thought was a very reasonable suggestion - that when a service was to be held in their church during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity on their evening they should join in that rather than have their normal meeting. However, they would have none of it, and I suppose my annoyance about that was just a little obvious. I concluded the meeting with a prayer that I often used at the end of business meetings, that went something like this -"Lord, where we are right, confirm us; where we are wrong correct us; where we are naive, enlighten us etc. etc. " When I realised that Mrs B was staying away when I took services at Edith Avenue, I called on her and

was greeted with "We are not friends, you know"! It seems that after the Sisterhood Annual Meeting she had asked her niece what "naive" meant. "I'll look it up in the Dictionary ", said Irene, and after doing so informed her aunt that it meant stupid.

"He's not going to call me stupid!" was the response to that. Well, I explained that naive didn't really mean stupid, and that moreover that prayer was one I often used.

I grovelled (I got quite good at grovelling), and friendship was restored. Indeed, she knitted baby clothes for our new baby when she was born.

After four years in Washington amongst some very fine people, some of whom we are still in touch with, we moved down the road to Sunderland - and some more funny, sad and strange experiences, which I hope to write about in the next edition of Crosspoint.

We now move forward to the next stage when formal plans are completed, planning applications are made, and tenders are sort. We are optimistic the work will commence later in the year and be completed by early April 2024. Watch this space!

#### SAM AND HIS BLUE BADGE CAMPAIGN

In the November edition of Crosspoint Pat (Taylor) told us how her family were getting on. Her grandson Sam, has been doing really well at the Star College at Ullenwood and last year he launched a campaign to get the blue disabled badge changed to make it more inclusive.

Sam has a chromosomal condition that often leaves him fatigued and in pain and this can affect his mobility meaning he needs to use a wheelchair on occasions. The syndrome that Sam has (DiGeorge syndrome) gives him a cleft palate, affecting his speech, and scoliosis, which affects his back, but he has no learning difficulties and has normal intelligence.

However because he can walk some of the time he, and others with similar conditions, find they are challenged as to why they need a disabled badge as their disability is not always obvious.

He is calling for the disabled badge to include a standing figure together with one in a wheelchair, to represent unseen disabilities and he is lobbying MP's to get this changed. His college are backing his campaign and applaud his determination.

Many of us have followed both Sam and Evan's progress since they were little, and it is heart-warming to see how much Sam has achieved against all odds – all credit to his bravery and determination. We wish him well with the campaign and look forward to hearing more of his endeavours.

So as we all seem to say every year - 'Christmas came and went so quickly'. But after the previous two years when so many of our traditional celebrations did not 'come ' or 'go' at all, because of covid restrictions, it was a delight this



year to be able to rekindle events such as our 'Carols by Candlelight' on the Wednesday evening just before Christmas. The weather was clear by then and we were delighted to welcome a good congregation back to the Chapel. It was a wonderful atmosphere just like old times.

Into January we found a local arrangement on the plan for one Sunday morning. It so happened that our Tewkesbury Harmony Worship Group had prepared a Christmas Special Harmony Praise for the Sunday afternoon of December 11<sup>th</sup> at Tewkesbury but as many of you will recall that was the weekend of the snow and most services were cancelled. So with some adaptation we were able to bring a 'Belated Christmas Harmony Praise' to Apperley in late January. It appeared that the congregation thoroughly enjoyed revisiting the Christmas message whilst not having to worry about the turkey in the oven at home!

Sadly, later that same day, we received the very sad news that John Lewis, of Elmstone Hardwick, had passed away. We were all privileged to have shared in John and Helen's Diamond Wedding anniversary celebration at the Chapel on a Sunday morning late in November last year. It is planned to hold a thanksgiving service in the Chapel in the spring when we will be able to celebrate his life and give our final farewells.

Q. 'How are you managing to survive now that you have moved after around 17 weeks in your new home?' A. The atmosphere that has been apparent, even before day 1, has been truly positive, the explanations given at depth with slides shows, facts and projections demonstrated how difficult life appeared to be just around the corner if we remained in our 133 year old building!



The church family has been truly wonderful throughout this time, and although there have been many regrets; it would be false not to say so; the positive attitude has been tangible and real.

The national figure for loss of the family, due to moving premises, is apparently as high as 26% - gazing around on a Sunday morning there is no indication of this at all – the fact the Church Council was 100% in favour of the move was a huge vote of confidence!

On a practical level we are very fortunate that Winchcombe Day Centre have afforded a large store room where most of our dedicated equipment is kept, much of it on wheels, our lectern, some of our chairs, 63" television for the slides, communion elements etc --- PLUS there is an excellent team to return everything after the Sunday service: the room is then ready for the normal, Monday, Day Centre model. Kathy and husband Stephen set up the operation on Saturdays and we are so grateful for their tireless efforts.



Preachers, ordained and local, have been very supportive with remarks as to the genuine warmth from the family and the togetherness and closeness experienced, the superb hymn singing, the fact that there is not a huge 150 seater room to preach to and the depth of the chatter before and after, during coffee. A few new faces have appeared and we look forward with enthusiasm to a bright future – **BE BOLD - GOD IS WITH US.....**


