#### **Dear Friends**

"When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and stood at the entrance of the cave." 1 Kings 19:13

Sometimes I wonder how I would even be able to do my job without modern technology. It bears wonderful fruits such



as being able to respond to calls, emails and texts much more efficiently than before the days of mobile devices. The downside for me is that it contributes enormously to the busyness of my life. I find people expect responses within a few hours, if not immediately. And although it means I can achieve so much more in a lot less time I am not sure this is really good for any of us? With the event of ever increasingly sophisticated technology multitasking becomes a feature of everyday life before we even realise it.

Sometimes I find myself being pulled in all directions, most often according to other people's agendas!

The biggest casualty of such a lifestyle is the ability to become inwardly still, *to remain centred*, might be another way of putting it. So active have our minds become in handling the challenges of modern life with all its noise, diversions and distractions vying for our attention that we become tossed about by the prevailing external conditions. Think of how we can now have news stories from anywhere in the world beamed into our living rooms so that we could, if we chose to, have a 24 hour media commentary. Such commentary can range from reasonable coverage to totally biased and inflated opinion and even fake news.

In a nutshell, modern technology has enabled an insidious bombardment on our very being so that external (and potentially

harmful) influences have a greater control over us than we realise. How on earth are we to discern God's voice in all of this? I am reminded of Elijah on mount Horeb pulled about so many forces in his life at that moment, trying desperately to listen for and to God's voice but the noise and drama of the earthquake, wind and fire of his external world meant that he couldn't, there was too much vying for his attention too. But then, turning his attention inwards (represented by the cave),he finds that precious place where God indwells the soul and finally he regains his focus, he becomes present to God's presence and in the silence he is able to hear the whisper of God's voice.

I am so thankful for the salutary message in this passage from the first book of Kings. It continues to change my whole approach to the pressures of modern life and helps to remind me where that cherished still small voice might be discerned. I now take a minimal approach to modern technology; I consciously choose to centre myself in the cave rather than being whipped about by all the external drama. Here, in the centre of my being, do I find God's voice and discern its gently whispered wisdom. Only this voice will lead me in right paths and restore my soul!

#### However did we arrive here?

or

#### A potted history of the Christian Church in umpteen episodes Part 7

At last we reach that point in our story when the word 'Methodist' first appears, and we are confronted by two paradoxes:

- that word proudly owned by millions around the world today began as a derisory nickname for a group of Oxford students in the early years of the eighteenth century!

- the founder of the Methodist Church, John Wesley, never intended, and never wanted, to found a church. Yet we belong to "The Methodist Church"!

John (1703), and his brother Charles (1707), were two of the nineteen children (of whom just ten lived to maturity) born to a Church of England clergyman, Samuel Wesley, and his remarkable wife Susanna. After school at Charterhouse John studied at Christ Church, and then became a Fellow of Lincoln College, Oxford. Here he joined with others, including a young Gloucester man, George Whitfield, in forming a group meeting regularly for prayer and Bible study at set hours, who lived very orderly lives, and engaged in various good works such as prison visiting. The members of 'The Holy Club ', as it was called, stood out in an Oxford not noted for such things, and because of the methodical way in which they lived were ridiculed by fellow students as 'Methodists'.

Hence our name!

Whilst at Oxford John and Charles, like so many University men in those days (the majority of whom were far less "serious" than the Wesleys!), were ordained as clergymen in the Church of England, John spending some time as a curate to his father in his Lincolnshire parish of Epworth. In 1735 John decided that the best way to serve God and to secure the salvation of his soul, for he felt that he was nothing like as good a Christian as he should be, was to travel to the new colony of Georgia in America and to practice that service there. In brief ( for this is a potted history), his time in the New World was a disaster, not least because of his relationship with a young lady, Sophie Hopkey, to whom he proposed marriage, then decided not to marry, and whom he turned away from Communion when she married somebody else! It was a broken and confused man who returned to these shores, but within a few months he underwent an experience that was to lead to the Methodist movement and eventually the Methodist Church.

On the voyage to Georgia John had been much impressed by the behaviour of a group of Moravians (a sect in central Europe) who continued to sing praises during a storm that threatened the vessel and the lives of its occupants. Back in England his contact with the Moravians, whose probing sowed more and more doubts in his mind about the state of his soul, led him to go "very unwillingly" ( as he puts it in his Journal, and which makes me feel less guilty about the spirit in which I have sometimes attended such things !) on May 24th 1738 to a meeting in a house in Aldersgate Street, London, where he "felt his heart strangely warmed" and that he "did trust in Christ, and Christ alone, for salvation". This is often called his 'conversion', but that can surely only be an appropriate term if we recognise that a person may have several conversions. Better to think of it in Wesley's own terms of his exchanging the "faith of a servant" for the "faith of a son", or of his dwelling thenceforth not on what he could do for God, but on what God had done for him. That Aldersgate experience was an important stage on the journey that was to lead in 1739 to his consenting "to become yet more vile" and agree to George Whitfield's suggestion that he should preach in the open air to the colliers of Bristol, generally recognised as the beginning of "Methodism" as a renewal movement in the Church of England, reaching out to the increasing numbers of unchurched.

Next time - how this movement reached our area and what happened to it as it grew.

"He did?" said the minister.

"Oh, yes" she replied. "He said even He hasn't been able to get into your church yet, and He's been trying for years".

#### MY RECOLLECTIONS OF THE SECOND WORLD WAR by Trevor Upton

I was born in July 1940 on a day when it had been very hot and there was a thunder storm and an air raid, so I arrived to a lot of noise! Our family were living in 'Bomber Alley', as it was known, in Deptford, south east London, about one mile from the River Thames. There were 'Ack Ack' gun emplacements near by so when I was older I would collect pieces of shrapnel each morning.

We had an Anderson shelter sunk in the garden which my Mother loathed as it was damp, smelly and very cold. The winter of 1940-41 was very cold with heavy snow. At night, as a baby, I was kept in and slept in a wicker clothes basket. On more than one occasion when the air-raid siren had sounded late and the raid had started I was quickly put into the shelter by my Dad for protection.

My first real memory was being lifted up onto my Dad's shoulders at our back door and watching the flames coming out of the windows and roof of a nearby home which had been hit by an incendiary bomb. At the time no one knew that two women and three children were inside the house and all had been killed.

In 1944 when the 'doodle-bugs' started threatening London, my grandma insisted that Mum took me to our former next-door neighbours who had moved to Arbroath in Scotland. We left King's Cross on a train that had over twenty carriages and two locomotives at the front and one pushing the train out of the station. The train was packed with forces personnel. My Mum got a seat, I sat on a table and Dad stood for most of the long journey. I remember throwing a penny out of the carriage window as we went over the Forth Bridge – it was supposed to be lucky!

I enjoyed my time in Arbroath and went many times to the beach at Carnoustie. We watched the trains as they passed near the top of the beach. It was amazing watching the fishing fleet in the harbour at Arbroath. One time we watched a Scottish regiment marching along the sea front, led by a bag-pipe band. It was thrilling to see them.

When the doodle-bugs stopped coming over London we were told it

was safe to return. Little did we know what was still in store – V2 rocket bombs. Mum and I returned home and one week later at 10.45pm I was in bed and Mum and Dad were in there's when a V2 rocket landed. The window was blown out of my bedroom window and I was covered in glass. The ceiling of Mum and Dad's bedroom came down on them, but they were unharmed. The front door was blown off its hinges. The pane of glass in the door flew at neck height and pieced the kitchen door. The mark was still there when we sold the house many years later. In our street all the windows were blown out and every chimney was cleaned by the blast!

We were extremely fortunate that the rocket landed in a sand pit at the rear of our house. If it had landed on the roof I would not be sharing these experiences.

## THE METHODIST CHURCH

Priorities for the Methodist Church

To proclaim and affirm our conviction of God's love in Christ, for us and for all the world; and renew confidence in God's presence and action in the world and in the church.

# An exhibition of Sculptures by Deborah Harrison

We are delighted and privileged to have some of Deborah's work exhibited at our church this summer.

Deborah was born in Yorkshire. She is a contemporary sculptor who specialises in stone. Her stone carving uses a technique called 'Carving Direct' which was used by Henry Moore and Michelangelo.

After discovering the art of sculpting she studied Fine Art and Stone Masonry. Deborah works in a wide variety of stones including Limestones, Alabasters through to Marble and also works in metal. Her work is a unique combination of traditional and abstract forms.

She has been interviewed on Radio Gloucestershire about a series of Portland Carvings called, "The Testimony of The Dispossessed' which highlights issues such as sex trafficking, depression, body image, addiction and the oppression of the poor. It is some of these sculptures that we will be exhibiting in our church.

She has exhibited widely both nationally and locally in Gloucestershire; including Gloucester Cathedral, Norfolk Cathedral and in St Stephens Walbrook, Sloane Square and the prestigious Royal Opera Arcade gallery on Pall Mall in London.
