Dear Friends

Last Sunday (21st May) I led the circuit service and in my introduction I reflected on my many years of association with the Forest of Dean.

It began when I was 4 years of age when my father purchased and restored an old forester's



cottage in a very remote part of the forest and made it into a weekend/ holiday place for our family. In fact the journey from our home south of Birmingham was only 50 minutes so quite often in the summer we would even just pop down for an evening.

With the help of friends and relatives the cottage was restored and made cosy and habitable. We used oil and gas lamps for light and a roaring fire in the inglenook fireplace for heat. We drew water from the well and there was a chemical loo in a shed in the garden. Despite some of the inconveniences this beautiful, remote hideaway in the Forest was a stunning retreat right in the very heart of nature. We treasured that place so much that it became more like home to us than our real home.

Many years on, when my siblings and I had married and left home, I continued to use the cottage as a retreat until the day my parents decided that they wanted to sell it. Loathed to let it go, my husband and I bought it and then made the necessary changes to make it a family home. We installed electricity and running water, extended the property and made a more accessible road. We started our own family there and as they grew they too came to love this unique hideaway deep in the forest.

As the children grew older we sold it and moved on, but it's true to say that a huge part of my soul remains there and memories still stir a sense of longing that feels like a deep yearning for home!

But that sense of yearning for home is not unusual. Many people will look back to the place of upbringing with fondest memories and sense a longing to revisit or to turn back time. Some will even look back to their ancestral roots and feel a deep connection with the family motherland even though they may never have been there themselves.

In a beautiful poem by William Wordsworth called a Lines composed a few miles above Tintern this same yearning is easily recognisable as he points out that even though, absent from that place for a long time, the sweet sensation of its remembrance carried him through the weariness felt in lonely rooms, 'mid the din of towns and cities'.

But I have come to see over the years that there is a deeper longing to which all of these are but mere signposts. And though we can never turn the clock back, if we discover this deeper longing then we realise that there is a homecoming that puts to rest all of our temporal longings for people for places and for times gone by as we discover that, in the great mystery of all things, there really is no separation.

That deeper longing, whether we are able to articulate it or not, is of course our longing for our true home in God.

Discovering our home in God is about realising that any separation from God we may have felt, was nothing more than mere illusion. We come to experience God's ground in our own soul, where it always was, and it is here that we find the absolute security of knowing that *all things shall be well*.

Of course there will come a time when this linear world is over for us and we will fully know eternal life in God in a way we can not yet comprehend. But this is not what I am illustrating here. For it is here in our very earthly lives that we can indeed awaken to the this sense of oneness, the illusion of separation from God is exposed and we increasingly come to realise that nothing that we have loved is ever lost to us and that the presence of all that we have truly loved is always with us, safely residing in Spirit, in the very core of our own being.

And whilst our linear minds will never fathom this great mystery, once we discover this true sense of home within us, then all our other longings will be satisfied and the promise that all our tears will be wiped dry is made good.

"It shouldn't happen to a (No, not Vet) Minister"

or

Some of the funny, sad or strange experiences during my years of Ministry

August 1971 saw Eileen, baby Helen and I move just a few miles nearer the sea, from Washington to the Southwick area of Sunderland, where I was to be minister of 4 churches. From our large detached Manse (with all its defects!) we moved into a Victorian terrace with just about 2 yards of garden between the front door and the street, but once again with far more space than we needed - and its own particular problem - MICE! As we lay in bed one night we were surprised to hear noises from the wardrobe: investigation proved it to be a mouse pushing round the floor a sweet that had been dropped there! No more welcome than the mice was the cat that we found one day in the back yard sharing the pram with our new baby, Karen!

One Saturday night we had just gone upstairs to prepare for bed when we heard the sound of breaking glass, followed by the door-bell. When I opened the door a lady was standing there. "I've just thrown my handbag through your window ", she said.

"You'd better come in", I said (as one does). We went into the front room, and there in the armchair that I had just vacated was her handbag, surrounded by broken glass.

There was broken glass all over, particularly in the girls' toy box. The lady explained that she and her husband had been arguing on the pavement outside and that she had raised her handbag over her shoulder to hit him over the head - and lost control of it!

It was a very sad story. For some reason they were having to live apart and whenever they did get together for a night out they ended up fighting. She was very apologetic and promised to pay for the damage - sure enough, she was round on Monday with some money. I admired her and felt very sorry for her.

Sunday, September 10th 1972 will always stand out in my memory. In the early hours Eileen woke me to say that our new baby was on its way! After taking Helen round to the folks who had agreed to look after her in these circumstances, I drove Eileen to the hospital and then returned to snatch a little more sleep before 'phoning at six to learn that we had another daughter. That morning I took the Harvest Festival service at Southwick, with 9 baptisms (the local vicar had a rather strict baptism policy!)

After lunch with friends, a quick visit to Eileen and new baby, before collecting mother in law from the coach station. Then the evening Harvest Festival service at Southwick - followed by the Annual Church Meeting!! Just writing about that has made me feel tired!

There were times when it was hard not to smile - when the Church Steward read out the Notice: "Please will you give the Heaster Hoffering Henvelopes to Mrs 'All "'. I had to be very careful to avoid Eileen's eye!

Or when the couple (no longer in the first flush of youth) came to see about getting married. The lady explained why she wanted to marry the gentleman -"There have been so many break-ins lately that I don't feel safe on my own - and I don't really like dogs". So much for mad, passionate love. Actually, it turned out to be a very happy marriage, albeit a fairly short one because of the husband's death.

I found myself dealing with many sad situations, alas. I took the funeral of a lady and her child who had died in a house fire, and when it came to the Inquest the husband asked if I would go with him. With growing horror I listened as it was suggested that the fire may have been caused by the electric supply having been illegally re-connected after it had been disconnected for non-payment of the bill. What could I say to this person next to me if it was found that he had been responsible for the death of his wife and child? To my enormous relief the Coroner finally concluded that the fire was more probably the result of a mal-functioning TV that had been left on.

Then there was the funeral where there were 5 coffins. In the

Washington days I had taken the wedding of a couple, and later baptised their twins. Sadly, the wife's father fell asleep in his chair whilst smoking, and the ensuing fire caused not only his own death, but that of his daughter, her young sister, and the twins.

A very good friend was Elsie, a widow in her fifties who was a regular baby-sitter for our girls, to whom she was "Auntie Elsie". Alas, she suffered from periods of acute depression, and it was during one of these that she threw herself off the Alexandra Bridge into the River Wear. Amazingly, she survived, because the winter coat she was wearing acted as a sort of parachute, and a boat was able to pick her up almost as soon as she hit the water. When I heard I dashed round to the hospital and found her wrapped up in foil like the Christmas turkey. She continued to be a good friend and baby-sitter, but alas this story doesn't have a happy ending. On coming back from holiday a year or two later we were saddened to learn that she had again thrown herself into the river - and this time there was no boat to rescue her. I have never quite forgiven myself for the fact that the last time I saw Elsie, when I drove her home after she had been baby-sitting, I was pre-occupied because of something that had happened in a meeting that evening and barely spoke a word to her.

Next time, our years from 1975 to 1980 just a mile or so from Southwick in Fulwell.

Frank and Mike were members of Tewkesbury Methodist Players from the beginning, 13 years ago together with their wives Pat and Hilary.

In concerts and pantomimes they sang, acted, did introductions to sketches and songs in their colourful waistcoats looking very dapper, and narrated the Potted Bible – Old Testament of course! They made rehearsals so much more fun with their jokes and banter.

We dedicated our recent concert Showtime to them both as a sign of true respect to them from us all. They were true entertainers and more importantly friends of us all and are greatly missed.



Our plans move forward and are very much in the hands of our architect now, who acts as our project manager. We continue to apply for more grants to help cover the cost including the building of the ramp to the new Changing Places facility.

MICHAEL JEBSON (1933-2023)

We lost a good friend in Mike, who died at the end of April, after suffering ill health for some time.

Mike was a very "hands-on" member of our church, involved in so many aspects of church life for many years. He had been a part of the Welcome Space team, and was very enthusiastic about moving the church forward. His experience in advertising and journalism stood him in good stead to advise our church on many aspects of publicity and promotion. For many years he edited the Crosspoint magazine, taking time to research and include a variety of interesting and thought provoking articles. He headed up our Advertising and Publicity group and also was an active member of the Worship Forum, suggesting and putting together services for our Local Arrangement dates. He also participated in "Open the Book". In fact there was very little that Mike didn't get involved in!

He was very knowledgeable about all things Methodist, particularly in any aspect of youth work and was definitely the man to go to for any information...!

Following National Service Mike's background was in publicity and advertising, working for Cunard and then English Electric but having been an active member of a youth club and then a leader at a young age, Mike decided he would like to do youth work full time. And so his connection with MAYC began. People at MAYC were helpful and encouraging and, after a lot of thought, prayer and discussions with Hilary Mike took the plunge. Hilary's attitude was that he was spending so much spare time on youth work he might as well be paid for it!

Following a one-year placement (a crash course because of Mike's experience with youth clubs) Mike worked as Youth Worker for the Liverpool Methodist District until 1969 and then from 1969 to 1979 he became Regional Youth and Community Officer in the north east. In 1979 Mike took up an appointment of Team Leader in the London Districts Region.

In 1982 he took a multi-racial team of seven young Methodists, aged between 18 and 25, from the UK to Zimbabwe, southern Africa, on the first leg of an educational exchange. Mike and Hilary's long-standing interest and

involvement with World Mission had begun.

Mike's next post was between 1985 and 1993 as National Training Officer for Youth and Community Work, including MAYC for the Methodist Church Division of Education and Youth. Mike wrote or contributed to many training manuals and resources for youth work during these years, including SPECTRUM which some of you may know of. (I did that course with Frank Manning way back in the 90's as it happens!)

Mike's final appointment before retiring was as a Field Worker for Training in the World Mission Team – World Mission becoming a charity very close to Mike and Hilary's hearts from then on.

He will be greatly missed but we are happy that we see Hilary, and are able to share our memories and some smiles with her.....

FRANK MANNING (1934-2023)

It was with sadness that we heard of the death of a dear friend earlier this year. Frank and Pat were long-standing members at Tewkesbury, and prior to that, at Bethesda Chapel, where they also made many friends. Frank was a very accomplished and popular lay preacher for over 40 years and received his long-service award here at Gloucester, before he and Pat made the decision to move to the Isle of Man to be close to their family.

It was a wise move given both Frank and Pat's health issues, and it is pleasing to know that, though missed greatly here at Tewkesbury, they were able to spend more quality time with their family for Frank's last few years.

His family remember that Frank was a man of many talents – teacher, preacher, sportsman, artist and an inspiration all of which we can relate to. He and Pat met when they were both at High School and it was whilst they were both in London that they went to a Billy Graham rally and became Christians – they never looked back!

Frank was a devoted Christian – a man of strong and inspiring faith, giving long and faithful service as a lay preacher. His last public address in church was just 8 weeks before he died.

At the end he was grateful to God for everyone who had crossed his path and wanted to be remembered as the football playing man. We might not remember him so much for his football playing here at Tewkesbury but we shall certainly remember him for his faith and inspiration to others.

We give thanks for his life and cherish our memories of him, and continue to remember Pat in our thoughts and prayers.

<u>"Lord you call us to Your service" (Hymn 664 from</u> <u>'Singing the Faith')</u>

This hymn was included in the service at Tewkesbury on Sunday 18th June 2023.

It spoke to me directly - as we sang the words, and afterwards.

The reason for this is that it reflects everything I believe happens in the spiritual journey which is human life - a succession of experiences of joy, pain, and every emotion and feeling in between. I believe that these experiences are there to teach us necessary lessons - a "refiner's fire", to quote a biblical or hymn writer's phrase.

Our Christian beliefs and understanding allows the Holy Spirit to work through us in the way we can best contribute (using both our strengths and weaknesses) - to fulfill God's purpose in our lives, for the benefit of others, and hence to assist our personal progress along the spiritual path we need to follow.

In living every moment of our lives according to the promptings of the Holy Spirit (that still small voice within us), we become the Earthly instruments that God uses to fulfil his purposes - this can only be to the good of everyone and everything.

The words of this hymn express the above thoughts in a gentle, meaningful manner, and that is why it so impressed me.

> Lord, you call us to your service, Each in our own way. Some to caring, loving, healing; some to preach, or pray: Some to work with quiet learning, *Crosspoint June, July, August 2023*

truth discerning, day by day.

Life for us is always changing in the work we share. Christian love adds new dimensions to the way we care. For we know that you could lead us, as you need us, anywhere.

Seeing life from your perspective makes your challenge plain, as your heart is grieving over those who live in pain. Teach us how, by our compassion, you may fashion hope again.

Lord, we set our human limits on the work we do. Send us your directing Spirit, pour your power through, that we may be free in living and in giving all for you.

continued and the estate agent has re-advertised with viewing dates of June 08 and 20 – the bid, closed tender, date has been set at the end of June.


It is sad for the majority of the congregation that the process is taking so long but when it is considered that the property has been standing for over 130 years a few months is not so bad really!


Greetings are sent to all our fellow churches in our cluster and we do hope to be able to join up at some juncture.
