FROM OUR MINISTER

Dear Friends

As I head off on my sabbatical many are curious to know how I will be spending my time so I thought I would share something of this here.

With family roots in South West Ireland, Celtic



spirituality has always fascinated me, particularly the transition period when Christianity first came to Britain, and Ireland in particular. Generally it was a peaceful transition as two seemingly different ideologies melded together. There were many similarities though that aided this peaceful transition. For example the theme of light was hugely important for the Celts, the solstices and equinoxes lay at the heart of pre-Christian quarterly celebrations as the sun was the 'great being' to whom they owed their lives. These ancient festivals then became dates which the church came to set as its major festivals. Christ's birth, for example, was set on the third day after the winter solstice, just as the light begins to appear after the darkness of the winter.

The Celts also loved triads - their wisdom sayings that came in threes, and the number 3 was generally thought to be sacred. So the idea of the triune God made complete sense when they first learnt of this. Also they believed that the divine was immanent in all creation, admittedly this would have been in the form of different gods but Christ superseded the old gods to become the divine presence in all. Hospitality too was a key feature of both cultures and in particular care of the stranger.

Sadly much of pre Christian lore and mythology have been lost to the mists of time as these were traditionally passed on down the generations orally, but the incoming Christian monks sought to preserve them in writing as much as they could (though undoubtedly with a Christian bias) and without this there would be very little knowledge of these subjects today.

For my sabbatical I am less interested in what was preserved but rather in what was lost and in particular the intimate knowledge and care and sense of kinship that the early Celts had for the earth; they knew their survival depended on it! But the church was keen to suppress their love of the earth - which was celebrated in songs, stories, poems and rituals - for fear of backsliding into earth worship...but here I wonder if the baby wasn't thrown out with the bath water!

So my sabbatical asks how we can rekindle that sense of kinship through a Christian perspective. What prayers, liturgy, stories, poetry and songs might we use that help us to care with our hearts, as well as our heads and our activism in these darkest of times for our earth. I am not sure yet what the output of this work will be but I am mindful of the words of Jeremiah 6:16 -

"Stand at the crossroads and look; ask for the ancient paths, ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls".

Joan Bottrell, Nora Booth, Joyce Sanders and Pat Taylor.



Getting down to Earth in Ledbury!

Ledbury Allotment Association (L.A.A.) owns an area of land, formerly a farmer's field, alongside the B4214 Bromyard Road from Ledbury. It is run as a charity - a social and community based organisation for the people of Ledbury. The aim of the L.A.A. is to enable local people to grow their own vegetables and fruit, (some also keep chickens and grow flowers) in a sustainable and, ideally, organic way.

I am one of nearly 100 members and have had a plot since September 2014. I find the experience very rewarding. There is a unique satisfaction in producing one's own food from seeds and young plants.

The most difficult stage is the initial preparation of the soil -Herefordshire soil is heavy clay, and much soil conditioner, manure and compost is required to produce a suitable loam. Also, weeds are always ready to make claims on previously prepared beds. Sowing and planting, then tending the growing plants, is much more enjoyable. The ultimate reward of finally harvesting the ripe produce makes the whole process worthwhile!

The yearly cycle of growth keeps us in tune with nature, in all its moods and manifestations. I grow a variety of fruit and vegetables, making use of some raised beds, a polytunnel and a greenhouse.

Unfortunately there is no mains water available on the allotment site. We use "water harvesting" techniques to capture rainfall and channel it into 1000 litre tanks. I have three of these on my plot, and provided they are completely full at the end of the winter, I can normally manage to water my crops with just the occasional top up from home, using portable water containers.

There is a warm community spirit amongst allotment holders, and this adds to the therapeutic experience of working with nature in a peaceful countryside setting.

Unexpected delights sometimes present themselves - like the partridge family - mum and six chicks - who waddled across my plot on one occasion. Mother partridge was too preoccupied with her babies to perch in the pear tree under which she had led them - perhaps it wasn't

close enough to Christmas for this to happen!

In 2018, the L.A.A. entered a float in the Ledbury Carnival. The enthusiasm of our members achieved a pleasing result - the judges assessed us as "First in Class", and overall winners in all categories!

Concluding thoughts / advice for would be allotment gardeners

Successful allotment gardening is hard work and time consuming, but for many it is a very pleasurable and worthwhile hobby.

We stopped at many different stations to pick up many excited children on this very long journey. I especially remember Black Horse Road - it sounded so foreign!


By the time we arrived at Chalkwell Bay (Essex) the lunch had been eaten.....

NESTA

I have to admit that when Pam asked me if I would say a few words about Nesta's time at Tewkesbury Methodist Church I got rather emotional! Not only was Nesta a much loved member of our church family but she was also a dear friend to me in recent years when she became a resident at Ashchurch View Care Home. My own mum – who developed a contented dementia in latter years - was already resident there and she and Nesta formed a sort of friendship – Nesta was incredibly tolerant of my dear mum who was totally convinced that they had been friends for many years and Nesta happily went along with that!!

It was a privilege to have some of the residents from Ashchurch View visit our church in December 2017 to see our Christmas Angel exhibition and to serve them afternoon tea and this photo was taken on that occasion.

Having been asked by Pam I then contacted many of our church members – and asked for their recollections of Nesta and Harold. Without exception the response was that they were the loveliest, gentles of couples, softly spoken and caring – and though they were deeply involved in church activities it was always in a quiet and unassuming way.

Harold and Nesta joined our church in 1952 having moved from Wales. Nesta recalled that at that time, the congregation was small but welcoming. They met Mary and Jim Lewis – who many of us also remember - and became life-long friends. They appear to have been the first to join in all the activities and groups that were happening at that time, often taking a leading role. The Young Wives Group started in the mid 50's and Nesta became a part of this group (it later became the Wives Group and has remained so to this day (with the inclusion of "Friends" as well) as everyone became not quite so "young"!)

Harold became Superintendent of the Sunday School and Nesta became a leader of the beginners' and primary section – a role later taken over by Irene Tolman (Roger's late wife) in 1963, when it became known as Junior Church. The Sunday School outings were wonderful occasions and Dorothy Davis remembers these with affection. *Crosspoint June, July, August 2022* Everyone was included and welcomed – and everyone was expected to help prepare the tea, and also to participate in a game of rounders! There was a great little group including Roger and Irene and Myra and Walter Horner who together with Nesta and Harold ensured a good time was had by all. As an aside - I understand both Roger Tolman and Harold sang together in the joint choir with the United Reformed Church, and on one occasion when they were misbehaving on the back row by falling about laughing the lady in charge wanted to turn them out! I wonder what Nesta thought of that!

Nesta was, at various times, a Trustee, a Communion Steward and a very talented flower arranger, an art she encouraged others to take up – always helping with church flowers for weddings and funerals, and the tradition of providing displays for the local hospital – something that continued for many years. In 1978 she organised a Flower Festival to celebrate the church's centenary, and to raise funds for the church. The flowers at that Festival are still spoken about and I'm sorry I couldn't find any suitable photos to show you.

Both Harold and Nesta were very active members of the Wesley Guild – apparently their silver wedding anniversary coincided with a Guild meeting when everyone celebrated with them! Nesta was also part of the Women's' Work group, meeting for fellowship on a Monday.

Nesta was always immaculately dressed so it came as no surprise to learn that she had worked in the clothes industry since leaving school.

So it was a natural course of events that she started pop-up, nearly new shops in the town. Her original idea was to set-up a Nearly-New shop with the intention of possibly making £100 – this turned into a final amount of £630 – quite an achievement in those days! The shops became a monthly stall at the Christian Aid lunches, and at the church monthly markets. Many of the congregation donated and bought outfits and apparently earned the church the accolade of "the best dressed congregation in town!" She was so proficient a sales lady at these markets that she managed to get a very good price for Dorothy's coat, which Dorothy had just taken off to try something else on! Fortunately the buyer realised the mistake when she found a purse and keys in the pocket and quickly returned it! Nesta carried on raising money for Christian Aid in this way for over 30 years. As she said herself – "It was not only about raising the money, but it was the wonderful people we met and the fellowship and fun we all experienced!"

Nesta was often found behind a stall or helping at church fetes – (and here I shared a few photos with the congregation - taken at the Methodist Circuit fete in June 1990 – one showing Nesta being presented with the trophy for the best stall, by some dashing young man! (Roger Davis!) And one taken in the early 2000's again shows both Harold and Nesta selling their wares at a fete or morning market).

Socialising and sharing fellowship was a fairly frequent event in church life and Nesta was very much involved in setting these up and helping with the catering. (More photos shown of a Guild outing to Monmouth in 1990, and a photo with Ruth and Mavis walking on the Malvern's after a celebration of Roger Tolman's 60th birthday in 1992 - now we all know how old you are Roger! And another showing a Guild outing to Bream in 1992. And a lovely one of Nesta on a summer outing for tea at May Hill in June 2002. There were several (more youthful!) familiar faces in this photo!)

Nesta was also very involved with the work of Mother Theresa – this all started when she read an article in a local Methodist monthly magazine describing Mother Teresa's work with the "dustbin" babies – babies who had been discarded and left to die in the dustbins of Calcutta. Nesta was so moved by this article she felt compelled to do something – so a group was formed from this and other churches in the town and met monthly to pray together and to knit baby vests, squares for blankets and to collect nylon tights to fill mattresses for the dying all to be sent to India. Nesta felt it was so wonderful that this communal work had brought together the different denominations of the town to share together in spreading the love of Christ. She felt a genuine call of Christ to do his work in helping the needy and neglected and dispossessed. I'm sure we can all understand this in Nesta, her being the most caring and kindest of people.

During Nesta's membership here, no less than 14 ministers came and went. Tony Windsor recollects that Nesta and Harold were in the party that travelled with him and Margaret for a very memorable trip to Oberammergau in 1990 to see the Passion Play – a trip that a couple of us in church are in fact making this year. Ann Leathwood, Ron's

widow, remembers popping in regularly to their home where there was always a warm welcome. Their home was open to all, and the kettle was soon on and perhaps one or two of Nesta's tasty Welsh cakes served up! They also opened their home on a Sunday after the evening worship for the youth group to gather and have discussions.

For so many years she and Harold were stalwarts of our church. They both achieved so much – often behind the scenes never wanting to be in the limelight. Well – with the exception of church concerts of course, when their thespian skills came to the fore! It was a regular event to produce a church concert, and Harold and Nesta often contributed to the songs and sketches – everyone loved to dress up! Tony Windsor remembers how they were both so loyal and encouraging to all taking part. (I showed a few more photos here of past productions – the first one quite an early one – date not known – but apart from Nesta centre stage there are youthful versions of Jean Greenslade and Peter Stych to name just two. And one at the church concert of 1997 – with a very obvious Welsh theme. And I couldn't leave out a lovely photo of Nesta and Harold taken at the special service in 2000 to commemorate the refurbishment of the church).

Nesta became was our longest serving member having given so many years of loyal service to our church and to many charities that benefited from her hard work and her kindness and generosity. She was also a good friend to so many.

I finish with this photo of Nesta taken in 2018 as she cut the cake at the church's $140^{\rm th}$ anniversary celebrations and with some words from Ann Leathwood –

"They had a lovely serenity about them – a real, genuine mark of Christian love and quietness. We (being Ann and Ron) just loved them as everyone did".

I think we can echo that here today – you were much loved. May God bless you Nesta – may He hold you in his arms Reunited with Haroldand give you peace.

Refunding Purchases made for Tewkesbury Methodist Church

HSBC started charging fees on charity bank accounts last November. Tewkesbury Methodist Church has since paid around £19 each month in bank fees. This includes a charge of 40p per cheque raised or cashed, whereas all electronic payments (standing orders, direct debits and BACS transfers (Bankers' Automated Clearing System)) have no additional charge. To minimise our bank charges, from now on, anyone who has bought anything for the church will be reimbursed by BACS transfer, rather than by cheque. Carol Smith and Julie May will meet twice a month and will together setup the transfers, which will pay straight from the church to the receiving bank accounts in the following three working days.

Please pass all church related receipts and invoices to Julie May. Please include your bank details with your next receipt or invoice:

- Bank account name (as it appears on your cheque book, bank statement or banking app),
- Bank sort code (6 digits, often formatted 12-34-56) and
- Bank account number.

Do not include the long number across your credit or debit card or the 3 digit number on the back of the card. You only need to provide your bank details once; just update us if you change bank account. I appreciate this is a change so please contact Carol or Julie with any queries. Thank you.



<u>New Life of Methodism in</u> <u>Winchcombe</u>

The existing church was built on land purchased in 1884 and it was opened in 1885 – 137 years later we have suffered from the use of soft Cotswold stone on so many occasions. Time marches on and despite many, many thousands of pounds being raised and spent we have been forced into some radical thinking!

Nobody wanted to move from here: but with the two concerns of lack of volunteers to perform duties and the spiralling costs it is becoming impossible to carry on!

The circuit executive has been informed that our last service here will be: - **SUNDAY 16th October 2022 at 3pm** and the following Sunday--we will meet at Abbeyfields, Cleeve Room, at 10-30am – this is the 60 seater room at the rear.

The recognised Methodist procedures will be followed and by October, with the necessary approvals, new beginnings, new opportunities for us all--- the Church Council have carefully-- *and prayerfully*-- considered what we should do over many, many months.



Suggestions have already been made on public media, such as Facebook, as to what should happen to the building - once the circuit have appointed agents they would be the ones to approach, not us!! **This is OUR chance for new shoots, new energies and growth !** Numbers of years ago a preacher, Rev Dr Reg Mallett, put it very bluntly:-
